Students:

Quality of teaching


The passed out students thankfully remembered the efforts put in by the teaching staff in mentoring them. No grievance was record in connection with this.

Physical resources



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



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ACTION TAKEN REPORT-(2023-2024)

The institution has taken inputs from the feedback analysis report and given consideration to implementation of necessary follow up measures in the ways elucidated as below

Curriculum Improvement

Concern rose: Though a vast majority of the student population has given a positive affirmation to curriculum improvement effected by the University from time to time, a sizeable section is still ignorant of the development on certain attributes.

Remedial Measures initiated: The students who are found ill equipped to grasp the updates on various academic oriented quality measures initiated in both University and Institution levels. This has narrowed down the disparity between what they perceived to be lacking and reality.

Practical Components

Concern rose: Need was not acutely felt on having practical for certain courses

Remedial Measures Initiated: Students misgivings were removed by organizing demo on the relevance of core concepts in real time applications in corporate world through video lectures in multipurpose media centers.

Internal Evaluation

Concern rose: Continuous internal exams are eating up the academic schedule and compromise the teaching learning process

Remedial Measures Initiated: Adequate edification was rendered to the students with regard to the CII schedules which were prepared in conjunction with active academic schedules being rendered in an effective manner.

Further the everlasting exam like scenario experienced by the students was the offshoot of legacy issue concerning pen and paper model of examinations conducted by the University.

Quality of Teaching:

Concern rose: On the whole, the need for a mechanism to effect and improve quality improvement measures



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Remedial Measures Initiated: The mandate and charter of IQAC of the institution was the reference material to effect and sustain the momentum in the quality parameters governing academic quality concerns

Discipline

Concern rose: There was concern on the off the campus behavior of some students of the Institution on aspects relating to two wheeler ride and foot board travel in public transports

Remedial Measure Initiated: Prompt remedial measures initiated by reaching out to the local police officials and transport authorities to pay heed and act upon the opinion of the parents and general public.

Physical Resources

Concern rose: The standard of facilities in place is not comparable to the best of the institutions of the country

Remedial Measures Initiated: The parents were sensitized to the demographic variables and their influence on the growth and outlook of the alumni vis-a-vis the institution. Specific instances of provision of certain facilities on need basis and its resultant impact in the form of getting national and even international recognitions were explained. Further, they were assured of necessary follow up on their opinions in the times to come.


Conclusion




